The program targets low-to-moderate income residential areas.	Competitive Grants	In FY2025, \$17.8 million is estimated for community development grants. Of this, \$9 million is estimated for community infrastructure.	Units of local government in areas of the state that do not directly receive their own funding from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development	Community Infrastructure application requests typically due in March and applications due in April. Applications are available upon request by the Chief Admin/ Elected official for the local government. SCRC funds may be used for projects that meet one of more of the following investment priorities: Economic development that increases income levels, education and workforce capacity, critical infrastructure. SC Department of Environmental Services (DES) SC Rural Infrastructure Authority (RIA) Office of Local Government	STATE REVOLVING FUND (SRF) (water, wastewater, stormwater)	The SRF program provides financing for a wide range of water infrastructure projects. SRF finances most Clean Water projects, including treatment plants, sewer collection systems, as well as stormwater projects. SRF also finances most Drinking Water projects, including treatment plants, distributions systems, lead service line replacements, and PFAS projects. DHEC manages projects and all technical requirements of SRF. RIA issues SRF loans and manages loan and financial requirements of the program.	The SRF is a competitive low-interest loan program. Some principal forgiveness assistance is also available to eligible sponsors.	Loan funds available in FFY25 will be about the same as FFY24 when \$235M was available. Around \$44M will be available for principal forgiveness in FFY25.	Municipalities, counties, and special purpose districts are eligible. For drinking water projects, private, non-profits may also be eligible for funding.	SRF accepts Project Questionnaires (PQs) year around. The deadline for consideration for FFY25 funds is March 14, 2025. PQs are available at des.sc.gov/SRFcall . Final loan applications are accepted by RIA from October 1 to July 31 of each fiscal year for projects that have been invited to apply and have met the technical requirements of DES. 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SC Department of Environmental Services (DES)	EMERGING CONTAMINANTS – SMALL OR DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES PROGRAM (EC-SDC) (drinking water PFAS and other emerging contaminants)	This grant program provides funding for small or disadvantaged communities to assess and plan for existing PFAS contamination and implement remediation measures where PFAS or other emerging contaminants exceed EPA or state health advisory levels and/or proposed final maximum contaminant levels (MCLs).	Competitive Grants	\$20 million is currently available	Small or disadvantaged public water providers including many private systems (so long as the private system has at least 15 service connections or regularly serves an average of at least 25 individuals daily at least 60 days out of the year)	Submit a Drinking Water Project Questionnaire (PQ) to begin the process. SC Rural Infrastructure Authority (RIA)	INFRASTRUCTURE GRANTS (water, wastewater, stormwater)	The RIA provides grants for constructing and improving infrastructure facilities for eligible applicants statewide. There are three program categories: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Basic Infrastructure assists communities in bringing water, wastewater, and stormwater systems into compliance with water quality standards and improving the capacity and viability of existing infrastructure. • Economic Infrastructure helps build capacity for economic development or support job creation. • Infrastructure Planning helps small communities under 10,000 service population or located in Tier III & IV counties to develop solutions for long term viability of water, wastewater, or stormwater systems.
